A CHRIST-CENTERED WALK THROUGH THE BIBLE

Hebrews: Believe and Draw Near, For Jesus Christ is Greater Still (40)

INTRODUCTION

Author Barnabas, Paul, Clement, Luke, Apollos – "Who actually wrote the epistle, only God knows"
The author knew Timothy (13:23) & presumably the apostles – he wrote Hebrews before 70 AD

Audience Jewish Christians suffering abuse (Heb 10:32-34; 13:3) and temptation to turn back (10:24-25)

Teaches us something about human nature & sin - 1 Pet 4:1-3; cf. Num 11:4-4; 21:4

Aim The letter is a sermonic letter designed to show how Christ fulfills and exceeds OT expectation Bolster faith in the face of suffering (12:1-11) by increasing the worth of Christ (3:1-6)

Christ is "Christ is better" (25x)...than angels (1:1-2:4), Moses (3:1-6); Joshua (4:8-9); Aaron (5:1-10) Melchizedek (7); mediates a better covenant (8); offers a better sacrifice (9-10)

Key Themes in Hebrews¹

<u>Christology</u> : Jesus is fully God and fully man, serves as the eternal high priest who sympathizes with human weakness and who offered the final sacrifice.	1:1-14; 2:5-18; 4:15- 16; 9:11-10:19
<u>Anthropology</u> : All humanity faces eternal judgment for sin. Jesus Christ is the intended and only provision for salvation	4:12-13; 9:27-28; 10:26-31
<u>Faith</u> : Faith in Christ pleases God, requires conviction about the unseen realities of God and his Word, and produces perseverance.	4:2-3; 6:1, 12; 10:22, 38-39; 11:1-40
<u>Perseverance</u> : The litmus test for genuine faith. It is necessary for the Christian life. Hebrews warns believers of falling away.	2:1-4; 3:7-4:13; 5:11- 6:12; 10:19-39; 12:1-29
Eschatology: With the advent of Jesus Christ, the last days have begun, though they await consummation at his return.	1:2; 2:5; 4:9-11; 9:9- 28; 12:22-29

Warning Passages

"Hold fast to your confidence in Christ!" (2:14; 3:7-4:13; 5:11-6:12; 10:19-39; 12:1-29)

- Written to a Christian congregation—aimed at believers but also true for unbelievers
- Similar pattern in each, with escalation throughout the letter
- Do not teach that you can lose your salvation—God motivates with promise & warning

Warning Passages in Hebrews²

2:1-4	how shall we escape if we neglect such a great salvation?
3:7–18	do not harden your hearts Take care, brothers, lest there be in any of you an evil, unbelieving heart, leading you to fall away from the living God.
6:4–8	For it is impossible, in the case of those who have once been enlightened and then have fallen away, to restore them again to repentance.
10:26-31	For if we go on sinning deliberately there no longer remains a sacrifice for sins How much worse punishment will be deserved ?
12:25-29	See that you do not refuse him who is speaking. For if they did not escape much less will we.

2. Jesus Is Superior to the Mosaic Law (3:1–10:18)

- a. Jesus is greater than Moses (3:1-6) Jesus is over the house
- b. Jesus is greater than Joshua (3:7–4:13) Jesus gives rest
 - i. The failure of the exodus generation (3:7–19)
 - ii. Entering God's rest (4:1-13)
- c. Jesus is greater than Aaron (4:14–5:10)
- d. Interlude (5:11-6:20)
 - i. Warning against apostasy (5:11–6:12)
 - ii. The certainty of God's promise (6:13-20) (1) God's character, (2) God's oath
- e. Jesus is greater than Melchizedek (7:1-28) *Priest by the power of an indestructible life* (7:16) *He is able to save to the uttermost* (7:22)
- **f.** Jesus mediates a better covenant (8:1–13) Jesus inaugurates the New Covenant (8:6; cf. 7:12)

 Quotes Jer 31:31-34 Intended Obsolescence
- g. Jesus serves a greater tabernacle (9:1–10) *Jesus ministry destroys the first temple* (9:8-9), *and Applies the blood to heaven's throne* (9:12, 23-24)
- h. Jesus offers a greater sacrifice (9:11–28) The blood (10x/20x) cleanses the conscience (9:14), Ends the OC (9:15) & Ratifies the NC (9:16), Secures forgiveness (9:22), Put away sin (9:26)
- i. Jesus finishes the law and makes access into the heavenly place (10:1–18)

3. Call to Faith and Endurance (10:19–12:29)

- a. The full assurance of faith (10:19–39)
 - i. Exhortation to draw near (10:19–25) *Indicative* + *Imperative* = *Draw Near thru Jesus*
 - ii. Warnings against shrinking back (10:26–39) Greatest warning
 - iii. Examples of faithfulness (11:1–40) The greatest example (12:1-3); Incomplete (11:40)
- b. Endurance until the kingdom fully comes (12:1–29)
 - i. Jesus, founder and perfecter of faith (12:1–2) Run the race
 - ii. Do not grow weary (12:3–17) Suffering is part of God's fatherly discipline / sanctifying
 - iii. A kingdom that cannot be shaken (12:18–29) Amazing view of the universal church
